# THE LOCAL FUND for the Harrogate District

#### An introduction

THE LOCAL FUND for the Harrogate District provides a sustainable source of funding for charitable and community organisations. Local groups can apply for funding for activities and services that support people, keeping them connected to their community and with each other. Projects provide immediate and long-term benefits to local people and their communities.

THE LOCAL FUND for the Harrogate District addresses the needs of local people in the area around issues including:

- inequality and hidden poverty
- Ioneliness and social isolation
- · health and wellbeing
- activities for children & young people

#### Where the fund comes from

THE LOCAL FUND was kickstarted thanks to the generous support of the then Harrogate Borough Council. It has also been funded by the Harry Bolland Trust Fund, proceeds from THE LOCAL LOTTO and other local donors including businesses and individuals, which enables grants to be awarded each year.

The Panel that awards grants from THE LOCAL FUND is made up of community leaders, council representatives and local people with direct experience of the issues affecting communities in the district.

In 2025, the panel met in June and awarded **17 grants** totaling **£37,473**, supporting projects that address the needs of local people.

#### The area the fund supports

In April 2023 local government boundaries changed in North Yorkshire. However, the area of benefit for THE LOCAL FUND remains the area that was formerly Harrogate District and includes the towns of Harrogate, Knaresborough, Boroughbridge, Ripon, Masham, Pateley Bridge and the rural areas between. This geographical area reflects the intentions of the original donors to the fund, and the places and communities they wanted to benefit.



#### The reach of Two Ridings

Through working with Two Ridings, THE LOCAL FUND reaches locally trusted organisations, led and delivered by people with lived and working experiences of the issues being funded.

It has allowed support for both long-standing organisations and newly emergent community groups, confident that we understand their respective challenges and strengths. The fund has supported organisations working in both rural areas and local towns often overlooked by national funders.

#### The groups and people supported

In 2025, 17 groups received funding, including two first-time applicants and four groups that were repeat applicants. All the groups are small local charitable organisations with on average one full-time staff member, three part-time staff and 30 volunteers.

58% of groups have an annual income of under £100,000, 17% under £250,000 and three of the organisations supported by THE LOCAL FUND have an annual income of over £500,000.

A wide range of people were supported by the funding, including people living in poverty, people experiencing homelessness, children and young people, families, older people, people with disabilities, people in hospital, women who have suffered domestic abuse and those people who are rurally isolated.

#### Funded organisations in 2025

Chain Lane Community Centre is launching a new Community Gardening Service. The funds were used to purchase essential equipment, including a lawn mower, hedge cutter, strimmer, safety goggles, and gloves. They aim to create a vibrant, inclusive, and resilient community through high-quality green spaces, local projects, volunteering, and grassroots leadership. £1,132

Dancing for Wellbeing runs gentle exercise classes for people over 60, but it's far more than just a dance class. With a strong emphasis on pastoral care, the team takes time to get to know each attendee and offer signposting when someone needs extra support. The grant allows them to continue running two Monday sessions in Boroughbridge. £2,826

Darley Cricket Club, based in a large rural area of Nidderdale, has expanded to four cricket teams, two for 5–13-year-olds and two teams for the 13 years and over age group. The club plays a key role in the community, offering its pavilion as a shared space. The grant will help fund new windows and doors, making the building more comfortable and accessible for wider community use. £3,000

**Gracious Street Methodist Church** (GSMC) hosts regular activities for older residents in Knaresborough, tailored to different needs and interests. This grant supports ongoing costs for initiatives including Lunchlink (home-cooked meals and social dining), Memory Café (dementia-friendly events), Men's Club (briefings and breakfasts), CAMEO (group discussions), digital skills training, social games, and a book club. £3,000

Hampsthwaite Wednesday Group is a social group for older rural women, many of whom are widowed and live alone. A grant covered the cost of a coach for their annual summer outing, helping members enjoy a day out together and feel more connected. £250

Harrogate & District Community Action (HADCA), an independent charity supporting communities across Harrogate and North Yorkshire, received funding for their 'Power of 10' project. This grassroots initiative encourages young people to volunteer for 10 hours in their local communities, building confidence, wellbeing, skills, and employability. £3,000

Harrogate & District Over Fifties Forum is open to anyone over 50 and currently has 128 members. Their funding supports two group day trips, one to Kiplin Hall near Northallerton and another to Breezy Knees near York. Travelling in a group helps people to explore new places, make friends, and create lasting memories. £500

Funding for **Harrogate Baptist Church** has gone to the running of a young people's group. The space gives young people a safe place to connect, be heard, and work on their wellbeing. £3,000

Headway Harrogate & District have purchased promotional items (gazebo, flag, 6ft pull up banner, folding table and tablecloth) to improve visibility of the charity and to raise awareness for their work supporting brain injury survivors and their families. £1,000

Inspire Youth Yorkshire runs bi-weekly girls' sessions as part of a wider initiative to provide young people in Knaresborough with mental health needs, special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), and their parents a welcoming space to socialise through a mix of inclusive activities. £3,000



Knaresborough Connectors works to reduce social isolation among over-65s. Their funding is supporting three group outings, including a trip to Kynren. Covering transport and entry fees makes these events accessible to all, regardless of income, and helps improve wellbeing through shared experiences. £500

**Lifeline Harrogate** provides supported housing for people experiencing homelessness. Their funding is covering the costs of an annual seaside outing, an important opportunity for residents to build relationships and informal support networks. £3,000

Markington Memorial Institute are improving its community hall to better support activities and shared interests among residents. £2,775

**Ohana** supports families of children with SEND in Ripon and the surrounding areas. This funding will launch two new sessions in a dedicated space: one for baby sensory activities and another for a parent/carer support group. £3,000

**Pinewoods Conservation Group** are creating a signed circular nature trail through local woodlands. The new path will be accessible for pushchairs and wheelchairs in fair weather, helping visitors explore key points of interest in a safe and welcoming way. £3,000

**Taking Baby Steps CIC** provides 1:1 therapeutic support for individuals affected by birth trauma, perinatal anxiety, pregnancy and baby loss, and fertility issues. Led by Jane, an experienced NHS midwife, the project will deliver 46 sessions over 12 months thanks to this grant. £2,990

The Village Harrogate (Part of Hope Church Harrogate) is launching four 12-week wellbeing group sessions for new mums struggling with anxiety and loneliness. With no "manual" for parenthood and often overwhelming advice, these sessions create a supportive, non-judgemental space where new parents can connect and feel less alone. £1,500

#### 2024 IMPACT Essential Needs

Essential Needs is a Harrogate based charity tackling furniture poverty since 1995. Despite Harrogate's reputation for affluence, 7 percent of local children live in poverty, compared to 17 percent nationally.

The charity collects donated furniture, household items and electrical appliances, offering them affordably to those in need. People on means tested benefits or low incomes receive an additional 35 percent discount.

Working with local organisations including homeless shelters, addiction recovery centres and domestic violence charities, Essential Needs helps furnish homes for people moving into unfurnished accommodation. Their work is also environmentally sustainable, reusing 155 tonnes of furniture and appliances in 2023 to 2024.

In April 2024, they launched a free bed scheme to combat child bed poverty, following a Barnardo's report estimating 890,000 UK children lack their own beds.

So far, 75 free single beds have been provided to children previously sleeping on the floor, sofa or sharing.

To address the lack of bedding, Essential Needs secured funding from THE LOCAL FUND to supply 50 bed packs with duvets, pillows and sheets, ensuring each child receives everything needed for a comfortable night's sleep.

The LOCAL FUND for the Harrogate District has been supporting people and community organisations in the area for over seven years.

Despite a reputation for being a place of prosperity, there is much hidden need in the area, with many local people facing significant social issues.

The council, local businesses and generous local people have created an endowment fund worth over £776,000, and together with income from THE LOCAL LOTTO, have enabled an annual distribution of grants of around £42,664\* each year.
